HISTORY OF EDUCATION SOCIETY (GREAT BRITAIN)

REPORTS AND CONFERENCES

The Annual Conference of the History of Education Society was held in Liverpool in December 1992, entitled "Historical Perspectives on Feminism and Education." It was a highly successful conference organized by Dr. Penny Summerfield of Lancaster University. Over eighty delegates attended and twenty-two papers were presented. Professor Linda Perkins of the University of Illinois gave the opening plenary paper on the "Role of Education in the Development of Black Feminist Thought in the United States of America, 1860-1920." The rest of the conference divided into parallel sessions to allow more papers to be heard. Speakers included Professor James Albisetti (Kentucky University), Dr. Marlaine Cacouault (Dijon University), Ms. Carol Dyhouse (University of Sussex), Dr. Meg Gomersall (Bath College of Higher Education), Mrs. Sylvia Harrop (Liverpool University), Mrs. Janet Howarth (St. Hilda's College, Oxford University), Dr. Susan O'Brien (Anglia University), Dr. Birgitte Possing (Royal Library, Copenhagen), Dr. Marjorie Theobald (University of Melbourne).

The papers covered a timespan from the early modern period to the 1980s and reflected the heterogeneous nature of female experiences of education, both as pupils and as teachers. The public sphere of women's adult lives was considered by some speakers, including their work as teachers and as members of school boards. The conference concluded with a panel adding further international dimensions to the themes of the conference. Discussions over drinks and coffee were stimulating and enabled the fruitful exchange of ideas in an informal atmosphere.

A selection of the papers given will be published in the Autumn volume of the *History of Education*, 1993.

The Spring Conference was held in Birmingham on Saturday, 8 May 1993. Its theme was "Access and Entitlement: Local Experience in English Education, 1870 to the Present." Speakers included Dr. Roy Lowe, David Woods, and Ian Grosvenor.

The Annual Conference of the Society for 1993 will be held at Plater College, Oxford, December 17-19. The subject is "Children at Risk: A Study in Change and Continuity." Among other subjects, papers will be presented on deviance and punishment in industrial schools; child migration to Canada in late Victorian and Edwardian England; the interconnection between mass entertainment and the alleged "depravity" of the young; and conditions and changes in society in Sweden at the turn of the century.
