Charles University, Prague, Czechoslovakia
August 23-26, 1990

Theme: "Educational Reform between Reformation and Enlightenment" (from the 15th to the 18th century)

4 seminar groups:

1. Educational reform during Humanism and the Reformation.
2. Jesuit schooling and Catholic reforms.
3. J.A. Komensky/Comenius/
 - a) Philosophical foundations of Komensky's educational writings.
 - b) The concept of lifelong education in the work of Komensky/individual stages, preschool-school-adult education, education of old age.
 - c) Pedagogical heritage of Komensky/aims, content, methods, aids, organization of schooling/in various countries.
 - d) Education and social reform in his work.
4. From Komensky to the Enlightenment/Changes in school organization, in the interrelation between church and state, aims, content, methods, aids for teaching, etc.

The main focus should be put on methodological questions so that investigations in any period of the history of education could clarify the contributions of the history of education to our knowledge of the development of human culture.

International, comparative, and interdisciplinary approaches may well be discussed when considering the significance of, e.g., the many-sided work of Komensky in its historical context, his opening of new educational problems, and the impact of his work in various countries and in different periods.

Papers and abstracts:

The paper from a prospective participant must enable the programme committee to decide whether it can be accepted as a conference paper according to the following criteria:

- a) It must deal with a subject within the main theme and indicated subthemes.
- b) It must be based on the investigation of primary sources, not only on secondary literature.
- c) By its methodological relevance it must stimulate further research in the history of education, bring new knowledge and arouse international cooperation and exchange of experience in research or in the teaching of history of education.

The first draft of the paper in English, French, or German should be received by the organizers by **February 1, 1990**. An abstract in English, maximum one page long, typed A4, double-spaced with 2 cm. margin all around, should be included.

THE CONTRIBUTION OF METHODISM TO ATLANTIC CANADA

A conference on "The Contribution of Methodism to Atlantic Canada" will be held on the campus of Mount Allison University, Sackville, New Brunswick from 6th to 8th October 1989.

The keynote speakers will be Sir Owen Chadwick, formerly Regius Professor of History and Master of Selwyn College, Cambridge University, who will give a paper on "Methodist Origins: The British Isles," and Dr. John Webster Grant, Professor Emeritus of Church History, Emmanuel College, Toronto who will speak on "Methodist Origins: Atlantic Canada."

Methodism came to the Atlantic Provinces of Canada with the arrival of Lawrence Coughlin in Newfoundland in 1765, and then with the settlement of Yorkshire farmers in the present Nova Scotia/New Brunswick border area in the early 1770s. In time Methodism became one of the leading Protestant denominations and a major force in the region. Fourteen other invited speakers will explore the influence of Methodism not only on the religious life of Atlantic Canada but on such areas as music, literature, education, and society.

The programme will include a field trip, visiting sites of Methodist historical significance in the isthmus of Chignecto, a Methodist Hymn Festival to be held in Sackville United Church, and a Wesleyan Covenant Service to be held in the Mount Allison Chapel.

Mount Allison University is a singularly appropriate location for the conference as it is situated in the area settled by the first Yorkshire Methodists, and since it became from 1839 onwards the site of the various Methodist educational institutions for the Maritime Provinces from which Mount Allison University developed. The conference has been planned as part of the University's Sesquicentennial celebrations.

Pour les textes en français, vous référer à Eugénie Lévesque, *Guide d'Édition* (Québec: Éditeur Officiel du Québec, 1980). Les textes en français et en anglais devraient aussi se conformer, pour l'usage canadien, au *The Canadian Style: A Guide to Writing and Editing* (Toronto et London: Dundurn Press en collaboration avec le Département du Secrétariat d'État, 1985)/*Guide du rédacteur de l'administration fédérale* (Ottawa: Direction de l'information, Bureau des traductions, 1983). Trois copies manuscrites du texte doivent être soumises au Comité de rédaction.
